Dr. Avihai Kelerman



Dr. Kellerman is the head of the School of Education and vice rector at Herzog Academic College. He holds a doctorate in education from Tel Aviv University, on the teaching perceptions of Talmud teachers, supervised by Professor Naama Tsabar Ben-Yehoshua. His research interests are the history of education of the National Religious Education stream and the philosophy of education. Dr. Kelerman has been teaching Jewish Thought for many years and is on the National Religious curriculum committee for this subject. He leads teacher educational in-service training programs, with a focus on teacher and student empowerment.

Dr. Adam Haisraeli



Dr. Haisraeli is a faculty member on the faculty of education in Kibbutzim College, lectures at the School of Education at Tel Aviv University and is a Mandel School for Educational Leadership graduate. He heads the social involvement unit as well as the College's "Israeli Hope in Academia" program. His research interest is the sociology of education, focusing on: inequality and social gaps, the family-school relationship, informal education and learning in the 21st century. As part of his post-doctorate studies at the MOFET Institute, Dr. Haisraeli researched parental involvement on school change processes. Dr. Ayal Shaul



Dr. Shaul heads the Keshet Center for Professional and Continuing Education at Beit Berl Academic College. In his previous position as head of Professional development at the Avnei Rosha Institute, he laid the foundations for professional development of school supervisors. He has also served as general supervisor of high school education in Tel Aviv-Yafo on behalf of the Ministry of Education and oversaw the city's educational administration policies. Previously, Ayal was the principal of the ORT Yad Singalovsky school in Tel Aviv and the Givat Gonen high school in Jerusalem. Dr. Shaul holds a doctorate in business management from the Sorbonne, Paris. He is a graduate of Mandel School for Educational Leadership 14th cohort and of the Maoz program.



Dr. Ayelet Dunsky



Dr. Dunsky heads the School of Human Movement and Sport Sciences, as well as the department for physical activity and health in the elderly and a senior lecturer at the Academic College at Wingate. Her area of research is improving the quality of life of the elderly through physical exercise, and so she focuses on the components of physical health and their influence of various markers in elderly people's lives. In addition, her research papers include studies on how exercise training routines based on balance and coordination influence physical and cognitive functioning among elderly and young people. In the coming years, Ayelet plans to examine ways of integrating theoretical and practical knowledge to strengthen intergenerational relationships through physical exercise. In the first stage, she will foster a relationship between students planning to be physical education teachers and senior citizens and in a later stage, between elementary aged school children and adults to be mediated by physical education teachers.

Dr. Itamar Brenner



Dr. Brenner coordinates MA studies at Herzog College and heads the masters' programs in the department of Jewish education and Instruction of Jewish Thought and Philosophy. He edits Hagut: Studies in Jewish Educational Thought. Dr. Brenner holds a doctorate from Bar Ilan University and his research areas of interest are rabbinic thought, Jewish theology in the 21st century and the interface between these fields and education. Dr. Brenner previously lectured in various academic and non-academic institutions, edited the Segula history journal, and was on the editorial board of Maariv and Mekor Rishon newspapers, and the chief editor of Reuven Mass publishing house.

Dr. Eli Vinokur



Dr. Vinokur is the VP of Strategy & Academic Development at Gordon Academic College of Education (GACE). Eli is a graduate of Mandel School for Educational Leadership in Jerusalem. He earned his PhD from Haifa University' his thesis focused on the tension between cosmopolitan education and education for citizenship in local settings, in light of contemporary challenges. During his post-doctoral studies as an ISEF international scholar, Dr. Vinokur has been a visiting scholar at Teachers College at Columbia University, New York and at Oxford University, England. In recent years, Eli has initiated several academic and field oriented programs at Haifa University, including the program for social leadership and the program for tackling contemporary anti-Semitism. At GACE Dr. Vinokur directed a teacher preparation program for academics from the FSU, and established the department for informal (social and community) education at GACE. Vinokur also co-established the Migdalor professional development center for informal education practitioners. In addition to his work in academia, Dr. Vinokur has consulted to the ministry of education and currently consults to the ministry of higher and complementary education regarding the development of informal education in Israel. He also leads intervention processes in municipalities and schools to implement future-oriented social educational approaches. His research focuses on informal and social education, educational thought, and innovative teaching, facilitation and advocacy methods.



Dr. Afnan Masarwah Srour



Dr. Srour heads the department for early childhood education in Arab society at the David Yellin Academic College in Jerusalem. She is a lecturer and pedagogic advisor in this field, as well as a freelance evaluator of educational intervention programs in early childhood education.

Afnan received her PhD from the Hebrew University, Jerusalem. Her research interests focus on the intersection of knowledge, gender and religion, educational and interventions programs in early childhood education, family and raising children.

She has authored two books: Children, Motherhood and Occupation: Ha'etgar: home instruction for parents of preschool youngsters' program in East Jerusalem (2007) and Women of the mosque: subversive learning of religious knowledge (2017). She also edited Childhood in Arab society in Israel (2015).

Moshe came to Israel from Ethiopia with his family in 1983, making their way here on foot. He overcame the difficulties of integrating into Israeli society and reducing the gaps. After completing high school, he joined a teacher education college in Jerusalem and enlisted in the IDF to teach immigrant soldiers from various countries. He then taught in a boarding school in the north and continued with his studies, graduating from the University of Haifa with a MA in public administration.

Moshe worked with the Menifa organization to empower at-risk youth in Ramle and he developed a working model for communities. For ten years, he headed PACT (Parents & Children Together) in Afula , a program funded by Joint Israel and the Jewish Federation of Greater Washington.

The challenges facing the Ethiopian immigrants who came to Israel as part of Operation Solomon were complex and numerous. Moshe considers it to be a national challenge to help in this field.



Nofar Peiser



Nofar is in charge of planning for teacher manpower in education in the Division of Teachers in the Ministry of Education and is responsible for promoting an organizational climate of evidence-based decision making for planning. She develops comprehensive planning processes and decision-supporting analytical tools based on reliable information concerning teacher training and their integration into the educational system. Such data-based planning will enable the system to become more efficient and to promote evidence-based policy. One of the key tasks in her work is to determine training goals at the level of subject, education stage, sector and geographical area so that the number of teachers trained meets the system's future needs.

Prior to this position, Nofar held two significant positions unconnected to the field of education. She was a senior consultant at Tefen, a management and strategic consulting firm (2013 - 2016) and the head of a Clinical Analysis team at Teva Pharmaceutical Industries Ltd., a global pharmaceutical company (2016-2019).
